

MOTHER TERESA'S TOUR ABROAD

In October 1960, Mother Teresa was invited by the Catholic Relief Services—N.C.W.C. to the 30th Convention of the National Council of Catholic Women, which took place in Las Vegas, Nevada, U.S.A. This trip also covered San Diego, Chicago, Peoria, Washington, D.C., and New York, and within 35 days Mother Teresa circled the globe.

All expenses of this tour were very generously met by the C.R.S. in U.S.A. and by other charitable organizations in England, France, Germany, Switzerland and Italy.

Her sincere manner, heartfelt warmth and intense interest in the poor and sick people of India helped charitable organizations and private clubs abroad to understand better what was being accomplished with their donations.

Small work parties to wrap bandages and collect clothing are now meeting in homes and school halls in the United States and England, and also in Australia and New Zealand.

MOTHER TERESA'S LEPROSY APPEAL FUND

The latest Flag Day, held annually in the month of January in Calcutta, was the most successful so far. Many women volunteers with collecting tins were out on the roads and at the entrances to clubs, business houses and theatres, and a substantial amount was realized. These collections were further increased by donations from individuals, firms and other organizations, and by the sale of car stickers. The total sum of money collected was sufficient to purchase an ambulance.
